While reading in 1 Corinthians 3, I was struck by the personal metaphor Paul uses for the believer: "You yourself are God's temple and God's spirit lives in you" (v. 16). The earlier verses in this chapter build up the image this invokes in such a way that I was astounded at both its depth and practicality.

First, Paul discusses the foundation upon which individual believers (i.e. God's temple) are built. "For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already

laid, which is Jesus Christ" (v. 11). Paul makes it clear – for the believer, there is no other foundation available. Christ <u>is</u> the foundation of your life if you have declared Him Lord and Savior. This then begs the question: are you acknowledging Christ as your rock? Are you living a life built upon Christ as the central focus and purpose giver, or have you leaned into a rickety structure of self-reliance to support you? Does a foundation in Christ leave you feeling guilty about certain actions or attitudes? We must realize Christ still remains underneath the rubble we have made of our lives by trying to depend upon anyone or anything but Him as our support.

Secondly, Paul asks the believer what he is building *on top of* this foundation. What is the ultimate purpose of the structure? What tools, materials, and standards are being utilized to create it? Look at verses 12-13. Paul continues his metaphor are we building with permanent, praise worthy, indestructible materials (the gold, silver, and costly stones he mentions), or with lower value, temporary materials that can be easily destroyed by fire and struggle (wood, straw, and hay). A life built on the gold of prayer, the silver of Bible reading and discipleship, the costly stones of service and worship – this life will be made of quality materials that can weather life's storms. These require specific temperatures to forge and manipulate, and so impress upon us the need to use the proper tools and standards/measures in order to insure our build is solid. But if we are building with weaker materials – the wood of worldly prosperity, the straw of popularity, or the hay of self-reliance, our building will not only be weaker, but it will not stand up against the worst of life's struggles. Further, it will not demand of us the exacting integrity that the greater materials require. It can be built shod-dily and still *look* ok, even when it is about to fall down.

The point, dear brothers and sisters, is made clear in what Paul says in verses 14-15: "If what he has built survives, he will receive his reward. But if it is burned up, he will suffer loss; he himself will be saved, but only as one escaping through the flames." It is the difference of living a life for Christ daily and dancing into Heaven, versus living for the world and self and having "fire insurance", but with no joy and purpose. You are still a believer – you are still saved and nothing can snatch you from His hand. But it is time we build this temple the right way, so that our daily life, this eternal life, can be lived out fully, to the joy of all around us and for the glory of God.

School curriculum is kind of a funny thing. I don't recall learning the first thing about taxes during my school days. School never taught me how to wash a load of clothes, how to tie a necktie, or even how to change the

But somewhere along the way, someone who had their hand in developing Georgia state school curriculum decided that middle-schoolers really needed to learn some Latin and Greek root words and phrases. So I am betting there's not a single eighth-grader out there who doesn't know what "Carpe Diem" means... unless they were being seriously inattentive and goofing off during Language Arts class.

Carpe diem loosely means to "seize the day". It is a pretty common (cliché some may say) expression and we are taught from our schooldays that "Carpe Diem" is a battle cry. It is an anthem, a proclamation, a rallying statement. As we pump our fist up in the air and shout with all our might "Carpe Diem!", we know we mean that we are about to move into action. We are about to stop sitting on the sidelines of life and get down to business. We will no longer be scared, anxious, or paralyzed by indecision, but we are going to shed our insecurities and make the most of whatever opportunity is afforded us.

Over the last month or two, I have become convicted by God about how I am spending my time. Simply put, there is no urgency - no "carpe diem" - in the way I am managing my time and the way I am going about being productive each day. I recently discovered a feature on my iPhone called "Screen Time", which reports how much time I spend each day on my cell phone. I was aghast to realize that it was not uncommon for me to spend OVER five hours a day on my phone. Doing what? Well the screen time report informs you how much of that time was spent on Facebook, surfing the web browser, or playing different game apps as well... It was terrible, and I was shaken to my core. How could I possibly be investing five hours of my time a day to a phone? All the missed opportunities! (And before you pick up a stone to cast at me, I challenge you to check out your screen time report as well!)

So here's where I have landed recently. I know carpe diem is a little bit cheesy, but the past few weeks I have been praying, in no uncertain terms, that God would help me to make the most of each day, and the time that He has given me. I have pled with God that He would light a fire under my hiney when needed. I have begged God to give me a boot in the rear when it is called for. And I have been desperate in my request that He would help me redeem my time and use it for the advancement of His Kingdom in every way, in every moment of the day.

I don't want this article to be solely about technology, because for you it might be something else that is distracting you or otherwise preventing you from pursuing God-given opportunities and having a full life. But I would challenge you to begin praying this prayer: "God, help me carpe diem." "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." – 1 Corinthians 10:31
