In the 9th Psalm David says, "I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds. I will be glad and rejoice in you; I will sing the praises of your name, O Most High" (Ps 9:1-2, NIV). Sometimes in the midst of hardship one of the best things we can do is find reasons to give thanks. In this Psalm David expresses thanks to God because God has defeated the enemy; the wicked have been destroyed. Certainly, it is pretty easy to give thanks in the midst of victory. But, what about in the midst of defeat or hardship? Can we give thanks to God when we are anxious? Can we give thanks to God when we are grieving or when we don't get the test results we were hoping for? We all know that this is incredibly difficult. But in my experience, identifying those reasons for thanksgiving suddenly makes our hardships a bit more bearable. Gratitude in the midst of hardship allows us to focus on the good rather than the bad. As the saying goes, we no longer see the glass as half empty.

Over the past 14 months I have made a conscious effort to find things in my life for which to be thankful. Although Covid has certainly been a major instigator for hardships over this time, I think we all know that even without a pandemic life gives us ample reasons to not be grateful. The same has been true of my life. While Covid has certainly made life much more challenging, I must admit that the trying days I've encountered over the past 14 months has not all been caused by Covid. Still, in spite of that, I have attempted daily to remain grateful. At times I've failed miserably. At times, I've expressed frustration, even anger, with God because things didn't turn out like I had wanted. But, knowing how poor my attitude has been at times, I'm all the more grateful for the grace of Jesus Christ. When I sinfully took out my anger and frustration on others Jesus gave me grace (and so did they). In fact, he continues to do that with each new day. When I read this, I couldn't have better expressed my own thoughts about how believers (including and especially myself) struggle with living life in our own power. Enjoy!

It can be easy to become self-reliant. The world demands we be the best. We eat stress for breakfast and anxiety for lunch. We become accustomed to everyone around us coming to us for help. But the more this happens, the more comfortable we may become relying upon our own strength and abilities—and the easier it can become to forget the importance of serving as a channel or conduit for the supernatural power of God.

Many of us may think nothing of wrapping up our prayers and blessings with an "in Jesus' name, Amen" tag; that's the way we've done it for years, and it's just a jargon routine we have settled into. But what does that really mean? And do we really mean it? The Bible continually proclaims that the name of Jesus is the most powerful name we could ever say. That's the key to having demons tremble, chains break, and the floodgates of heaven open. More is accomplished supernaturally by the name of Jesus than by any other means. Operating in Jesus' name means that there's no room for my own name anymore. I'm laying down my own sense of identity and ability and exclusively leaning on His. It's not about my own resume or skills, but about His. It's a process of me ceding control of my own life and circumstances. I'm moving over and letting Jesus take the wheel.

There's power in the humility of knowing that we are just vessels for God to use however He chooses. And there's excitement and freedom that comes from knowing that when I make that choice, I don't have to carry the weight of expectation anymore. I can have peace and know that regardless of what happens, the supernatural power of Jesus can flow through me to do far more than I could ever do on my own. And when I bow my head to pray, I can be confident that I will be part of something special. Not because of who I am or what I can do, but because of the choice I've made to work for an Audience of One and give Him the glory for all that happens. In Jesus' name, Amen!
