Pastor's Desk

Have you ever noticed that within the church we use a lot of words that we rarely use elsewhere? Some fancy theological words that we use are: justification, sanctification, salvation and redemption. But there are also some less theological words that are used frequently within the body of Christ and less frequently outside of it. One of those words is fellowship. Churches have fellowship halls. They have fellowship meals and fellowship gatherings. Some churches may even have "times of fellowship" built into their worship services. Have you ever stopped to wonder why this word is so commonplace within the church?

When we look through the gospel accounts we see that Jesus did a lot of what we would consider fellowship. Jesus had 12 men and several woman with whom he was in just about constant fellowship. Jesus often entered into the homes of people to share a meal with them. I have even heard some people say that Jesus ate his way through the gospel account. When we look in the book of Acts we see in chapter 2 and 4 that the early church spent a lot of time together. They "broke bread together" regularly. The author of Hebrews says "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb. 10:24-25, ESV). When we take a sweeping glance at the New Testament narrative it is very clear that fellowship is supposed to be an important part of the life of the church.

So what is the purpose of fellowship? In its most basic form, fellowship is what helps us to nurture and develop our relationships with one another. We cannot develop new relationships nor can our current relationships grow without this important activity. I suspect that this is why Jesus made fellowship such a critical part of his ministry and why the early church prioritized fellowship amongst the believers. Jesus, along with the early church, understood the importance of relationships. And, if we are going to follow these Biblical examples, we must also understand this.

MAKE **DISCIPLES** 

If you haven't noticed yet, Harlem is growing. This growth brings with it the need for new relationships to develop. The same is true of HBC. As new faces begin to attend we must be diligent to develop and nurture relationships with these individuals. Remember, most of us were new to HBC at one point or another. When we were new, fellowship played a large part in our ability to connect with one another. So as we continue to see new faces join us for worship, consider inviting those individuals to sit with your family. Consider inviting those new individuals to join you for a cup of coffee or dinner in your home. Let's choose to take more opportunities to fellowship with one another, new and old, so that we can continue to grow relationally. Press on!



Maybe it's just me – but in the past few months, I have found myself becoming less and less tolerant of what can only be described as "constant screaming". My daughter turns on a kids TV program, and the main character is a young girl who operates at *full volume* 100% of the time. The sports reporters during half time talk over each other in increasing loud voices - all needing their point of view to be heard. I am in the middle of listening to a song and an ad pops up, 50 times louder than everything else. The constant and insistent sound of poli-

tics being shared by people on social media in ALL CAPS...as well as the dozens of daily pings of text messages from various candidates (how DID they get my number!?!?!)

## I tell you – I find myself seriously relating to the Grinch: "If there's one thing I hate, it's all the noise NOISE NOISE NOISE!!!!"

I am oh so tired of the constant screaming for attention that never seems to cease in a society where everyone, everywhere, is clamoring for someone to listen to them...even if they have to keep getting louder. Have you ever noticed that God doesn't really...scream? In the Bible, you will find Him to be firm in His righteous wrath, He will "rejoice over you with singing" (Zephaniah 3:17), and He absolutely will tell you what you need to hear. But in my studies this far (and please let me know if you find an example!) the closest God comes to SCREAMING at someone is when He tells Job, "Brace yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer me." No, God is far more likey to speak to us in a still small voice-as He did to Elijah on the mountain (1 Kings 19:11-13).

God doesn't need to yell at us to get His message across – and yet we feel like we have to "yell" at others to get their attention when we are sharing the Gospel. We feel like evangelism needs to be a big gesture, a huge undertaking, a long conversation that always results in someone accepting Christ. I am guilty of this - knowing that in social and communication platforms the church is often a blip on the radar of people's media consumption – I often worry that we are not BIG or LOUD enough.

But that's not God's way. God whispers. He comforts. He sings. He "quiets us with His love". And His commands to us are often gentle in spirit and nature: "A soft answer turns away wrath," (Proverbs 15:1); "A fool gives full vent to his spirit, but a wise man quietly holds it back" (Proverbs 29:11). And it is becoming increasingly apparent to me that it is the calm, quiet, consistency of spirit and conversation that will be far more impactful than megaphones and bright colorful banners.

When was the last time you had a relaxed, simple conversation with someone about what God is doing in your life? Or just shared your heart about why you love getting to worship on Sunday? The most precious and effective things in life are usually not the big moments of shouting, but the steady, habitual, even mundane way of daily working out your faith, giving God glory and honor in everything, and consistently telling

But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect. (1 Peter 3:15)

As you are doing so, I will be praying for you. And I hope you will do the same for me. In 10 months' time, I want to look back and not be filled with regret as I survey all my missed opportunities. Today is the perfect day to start making the most of each day.
