The Pastor's Desk

We often think of Easter as a single day or event. Yes, it is a wonderful day - but it is still often limited to a single day or event. But did you know that within the seasonal church calendar (referred to as the lituraical calendar), Easter lasts for seven weeks? Not only that, the reason the church now recognizes Sunday as the Sabbath is because Sunday is the day that Jesus rose from the grave. The intent here is to allow the good news of the resurrection to not only extend beyond a single day but we are to also begin each week celebrating and rejoicing the good news of the resurrection. As believers in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we should be a people whose lives are drastically shaped daily by this momentous occurrence. But how does one go about doing this?

One of my favorite New Testament scholars is a British Anglican priest named N.T. Wright. I recently read an article that mentioned some of Wright's thoughts on the subject of the Easter season. Wright claimed that this season should be marked with celebrations, one after another, as believers delight in the reality that the One who was dead is now alive! But I would add to this thought and say these same behaviors and attitudes should be lived out all year long. When we do not to allow the resurrection of Christ to drastically shape all aspects of our lives we are limiting the power of this salvific event. We are failing to see how this event not only affects our lives in the present, but it also affects our lives for eternity. There is no other event, nor will there ever be another, that has implications that reach so far.

Now I suspect that few of us are going to throw resurrection parties weekly. So how should we go about living our lives in light of the resurrection event? I recently read an article by Presbyterian pastor Stuart Strachan who speaks to this. He says that the resurrection calls believers "to internalize the message of God's great love and hope and new life that has been offered through His Son. This practice starts with an event outside of ourselves, and has the ability to lead to ripples of kingdom life wherever it is embraced" (in his book Preaching the Resur-

As we continue to move through the Easter season, let's spend some time considering what sort of "event outside of ourselves" that the resurrection calls us to. Perhaps it calls you to serve in a new or more involved capacity. Maybe it calls you to experience deeper more meaningful worship. Or, maybe the resurrection challenges you to expand your current perspectives and/or worldviews. No matter how the resurrection story changes you, we know that this good news simply cannot leave us unchanged. Let's strive daily to live in light of His resurrection!

Thanks be to God! He is risen!

Sometimes we get to know our favorite church songs so well, that we begin to sing them by rote. We don't think about what we are singing – we just so enjoy the comfort of the familiar that we, unintentionally, forget that we are singing to God. We forget that we are commanded to "praise, extol, and honor the King of Heaven" (Daniel 4:37), not just to bring music.

When I find myself bringing musical worship to God out of habit, rather than intention, it is those moments when I like to seek out either very new or very old songs. Something outside my comfort zone. Something with lyrics so powerful, I can barely get them out through the tears.

As we move beyond Easter into April – check yourself at the door of worship. Lay aside burdens and worries and cares, pause for a moment to pray for the ability to hear what you are singing, to mean what you are lifting up, and to be touched by it – whether it be an old favorite or something completely different to you. *Do not waste time in worship singing by rote.* We have so much to praise our God for – so much to be thankful for as we remember what He did for us at Easter.

May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart, be pleasing in your sight, LORD, my Rock and my Redeemer. (Psalms 19:14)
