The Pastor's Desk

Generally, during the month of January I spend some time looking ahead. I spend some time wishing, hoping, and setting goals for the New Year. I have a tendency to cling to the words of the prophet Isaiah who says, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" In some ways, this text does call us to look forward and to take hold of the promise that God is "doing a new thing." This passage calls us to be hopeful and to anticipate the good things that God is going to do. However, the reason we have the ability to be hopeful and to anticipate God's future work in our lives is because of God's faithfulness to us in the past. This is why we see so many Old Testament texts that call the nation of Israel to "remember" what God did in their lives. The evidence of God's past work in our lives is the foundation of our future hope. So, if we are to look into the New Year with great anticipation then we do so with the memory of God's past action.

This season, as you begin 2025 I want to encourage you to spend time reflecting on where you saw God's faithfulness to you in 2024. For some of you identifying His faithfulness will be pretty easy. If you experienced the birth of a baby, a new job, a successful surgery, retirement, or graduation you will easily be able to see God's work. But I know that there are many who have had difficulties in 2024 and for you, it may be more difficult to see God's work in your life. If you can relate to this, let me encourage you to reflect on the "small" victories. Perhaps you saw God's faithfulness in the support of friends and family during a season of loss or illness. Maybe you saw God's grace or provision after an accident or job loss. It could be that you are walking into 2025 with some unresolved circumstances or conflicts. If you can relate to any of these situations it may be challenging to see God's provision. And yet, I promise, if you spend time reflecting and praying through the past year the Spirit will remind you of God's work in the midst of those trials.

As we move into 2025 my prayer is that we will have the eyes to see God's work in and through us. I pray that whether we are in seasons of "feast" or in seasons of "famine" that we will know that our God is for us. I pray that we will commit to remind one another and to share with one another the goodness of our God always. And finally, I pray that we will eagerly anticipate the good plans that our God has for us both individually and corporately.

As we move into a new year, my prayer is that I become better at the ministry of presence. Of being there when a need arises, even if and especially if I don't have a solution to help. I want to show up without being asked. I want to do what is needed without telling someone, "Let me know how I can help." I've found that in the hardest moments of trials or grief or sorrow, it is challenging to articulate what you need, and that the greatest gifts are those given in sincerity of heart to help, even if they aren't sure what to do.

I recently looked at some ministry demographics for our area, and one particular fact stuck out to me. Of the top three things that local people (within a 5 mile radius of HBC) are looking for in a church, one is warm and friendly encounters, and another is the opportunity to develop personal relationships. Hurricane Helene only highlighted this reality: people are struggling, and lonely, and hurting. Being there for them is something we CAN do, both inside and outside our church body. Whether it is a meal or a card or a prayer or a text, the ministry of presence is sorely needed in our world today.

I pray that as we enter 2025, HBC will be a church that walks alongside our community during whatever storms life brings, and that we'll befriend them during the good times, as on our way we go.

\*\*\*If my wife reads this, I hope she doesn't ring my neck when I get home! Recently Katie and I were given some cookies for Christmas. Chocolate chip and M&M. Man oh man, they were delicious. The cookies were given in a plastic holiday container, and it seemed fairly evident to me that the person who gifted us with the cookies intended for us to keep the container. But when we finished the cookies (it did NOT take long), my wife insisted I returned the container. So I relented and returned the container.

What does this short story have to do with anything? In Christ, we all have been given a gift. The best gift, in fact. The Light of the World, the Messiah, the Prince of Peace came into the world to bring a path of salvation for all the unrighteous. The atonement of sins, and redemption through Jesus' blood... Christ came in order to see "God and sinners reconciled". This gift – the gift of salvation – is achievable only through faith upon the One who provided the sacrifice of His shed blood. But so many of us try to "add" our good deeds on top of God's grace expressed through the old, rugged cross. You know what that's kinda like? It's kinda like eating the cookies and returning the container!

It's important to note – this is a learned behavior. Many of us were recently around little ones opening presents around a Christmas tree. I bet none of you witnessed a child turn to their parents or grandparents and say: "Are you sure? This is too much, I can't accept this great gift!" I wonder if this is partially what the Bible is speaking of when it mentions a "childlike faith". Children have faith that a gift is theirs fully and completely, with no strings attached. But as we grow older and mature into adults, years of social conventions and life lessons about etiquette and polite manners become ingrained in us and we feel a sense of indebtedness that – at times – prevents us from accepting the generosity of others.

But we must always be mindful not to reject the generosity of the loving Father. Salvation comes from Christ alone, through grace alone, and it requires our faith alone. There is nothing we can do to be more or less deserving of Heaven. And there is nothing we should do to try to curry more favor from our co-Heir. We simply enjoy the gift. So eat the cookies... and when you are done, keep the container. God would not have it any other way.
