Pastor's Desk

The

"Create in me a clean heart, O God and renew a steadfast spirit within me."

Psalm 51 is one of the most heartfelt and vulnerable prayers recorded in Scripture. It was written by King David after he was confronted by the prophet Nathan regarding his sin with Bathsheba. Faced with the gravity of his actions, David doesn't hide or excuse himself—he comes before the Lord completely broken, overwhelmed by the weight of his guilt, and in desperate need of mercy.

In his prayer, David pleads with God for forgiveness. In verse 10, we hear the cry of a repentant heart: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." At this moment, David's deepest desire is not just to be forgiven—it is to be transformed. He longs for God to purify his heart and to restore him to a place of spiritual integrity and closeness with the Lord.

Have you ever paused to consider what such a reformation of the heart truly involves? At the very least, it begins with a willingness—a readiness to be changed by God. It means adopting a fresh perspective, one that shifts our desires away from self and aligns them with the heart of God. It requires surrender. It requires change. Change, however, doesn't come easily to most of us. We often resist it because it unsettles us. And yet, change is the soil in which growth takes root. Think about the ways families grow: without change, there would be no marriages, no children, no new generations. Though it can be uncomfortable, change often ushers in blessings we never could have imagined.

The same holds true for our spiritual lives. If we desire to grow in Christ, we must invite Him to do the deep work of heart transformation within us. Like David, we must ask God to create in us clean hearts, to redirect our desires toward Him. When we allow Him to do that work, spiritual growth becomes the natural result. And truly, there is no greater joy than growing deeper in our walk with the Lord.

This call to heart change isn't only personal—it extends to us collectively as a church body. Harlem Baptist, like every local church, is a living, breathing community of believers. We are called to pursue Christ together, to carry out His mission, and to reflect His love. But in order to do this faithfully, we must each be willing to let the Spirit create clean hearts within us. Only then can we be united in purpose and filled with the vitality that comes from God alone.

This fall, you'll notice a recurring theme throughout our worship and ministry: "Making Room." Our community is growing. Our church is growing. And growth requires space—not just physically, but spiritually. We must be intentional about making room in our lives, our gatherings, and our hearts for what God is doing among us.

So throughout the month of August, I invite you to join me in a simple yet powerful prayer: "Create in me a clean heart, O God."

Let us also ask Him to renew a steadfast spirit within us, so that together, as the body of Christ, we can make room for His work—within our hearts, within our church, and throughout our community. May God lead us, shape us, and fill us with His Spirit as we step into this new season—together.

CONNECTION CORNER:

"Everything communicates...even, especially, NOT communicating."

For the last few weeks, social media has been very active with the scandalous story of two people who recently attended a concert. When shown on camera, they quickly showed fear and shame, and tried to hide their face. They didn't say a word...yet within hours, their names, faces, families, and situation were everywhere – and none of it was good.

I'm not condoning gossip or condemning them – that's not my place – and the entire situation is heartbreaking to the extreme for their families, business, and more. But I keep coming back to the way their reactions communicated so much to the audience, that within seconds they were called out. I keep thinking about how their families were tracked down within hours and (while empathized with) tormented with what has to be one of the worst moment of their lives. The situation has gone viral in a way that is unprecedented, and the keyboard warriors just keep coming: memes, videos, mock re-enactments at sports venues, the works. And the parties themselves – when they did finally respond to going viral, how people picked apart what they said, calling it "insincere" and a "mockery" of the damage their actions had caused.

When we are walking through our daily life...what are we communicating to the world about ourselves? About our families? About Harlem Baptist Church? About Christ? Would we be terrified if a camera was to suddenly thrust us in the spotlight – knowing that our actions/ attitudes/words could be damaging?

But would it affect how others receive the gospel? Would it make people go, "If that's how they act, I don't want to go to their church?" Does it make others question your walk with Christ? What are we communicating?

Or are we not communicating? Are we staying so silent about who we are in Christ that any 'scandal' would not surprise people. Would people be more shocked by the fact that we attend church, because our actions regularly speak otherwise?

So what are you saying? Would going viral help or harm your reputation? You can't control what people think...but you can control your integrity.

Who would people say you are if the camera was suddenly playing the story of your life to the world? What would people say about HBC if a camera was in the face of Sunday morning worship, of how we welcome visitors, of how we go about being a part of our community.?

What Worship Really Means

"God is spirit, and His worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth." - John 4:24

Dear Church Family,

As we come together on Sundays, I want to invite each of us to reflect on what worship really means. It can be easy to think of worship only as the time we sing, pray, or listen to the message during a service. Those are certainly important moments. But worship is much more than something we do during church.

Worship is our response to God's presence and His character. It begins with the heart. When we recognize who God is and what He has done for us, The Holy Spirit reveals in our hearts the spirit of reverence and gratitude. Whether we are lifting our voices in song, raising our kids with integrity, showing kindness to our co-workers that are difficult to deal with, sharing the gospel with our neighbors, or having fellowship with brothers and sisters in Christ; when God is the priority of all we do, that is worship. It is an outward expression of the inward change in our hearts, shifting from a 'me' focus to the 'Kingdom' focus.

Thank You for calling us into Your presence. Thank You for being faithful, loving, and true. As we gather, help us to lay down everything that distracts or discourages us. Help us to focus fully on You.
