The Pastor's Desk

This past Sunday, we had the blessing of witnessing three young women express their faith in Christ through baptism. Baptism is a beautiful reminder of what Christ—through His Spirit—does in our lives when we place our faith in Him as Lord and Savior. It illustrates the burial of our old, worldly selves—the death of pursuing what only temporarily satisfies us. And it illustrates the new life that is born within us when the Holy Spirit takes hold of our hearts.

To be baptized is to obediently follow the commission Jesus gave before His ascension, and to follow the example He set when He allowed John the Baptist to baptize Him. Baptism is a deeply meaningful moment for the believer—and for the church family as well.

Over the past couple of years, I've heard many Christian leaders talk about a revival or spiritual awakening taking place around the world. Just recently, I watched a CBS News story titled "How adults are rediscovering Christianity through baptism." It noted that adult baptisms have been rising over the past four years—and most surprising of all, that young adult men are leading this movement. That same trend was confirmed in an article I read from the Bible Society (biblesociety.org.uk). It reported that church attendance in the United Kingdom has risen by 50 percent in the past six years—particularly among young adults. In 2018, only 4 percent of 18–25-year-olds attended church at least monthly. Today, that number has grown to 16 percent.

If you're like me, you may find this surprising if you tend to see only what's happening in your own corner of the world. But when I look at our own community—and our own church—it certainly appears that God is stirring hearts here in Harlem as well.

There was a time when I prided myself on knowing everyone in worship by name. I could remember who was new and how many times they had visited. Those days are long gone! With so many new faces at HBC, it's impossible to keep up—and what a wonderful problem to have. Attendance has increased. Our children's ministry is thriving. More people are joining, and more are expressing interest in baptism and membership than at any other time during my years as pastor. Even more encouraging is the growing engagement across our church. Adult discipleship groups are thriving, and many long to be part of a community that grows in Christ and walks through life together. I anticipate we'll need to start two new adult discipleship classes in 2026. The number of people giving freely of their time and talents to serve, maintain our ministries and facilities, and ensure that everyone feels welcomed and loved has grown dramatically. When we pause to look around at what God is doing at HBC, it's clear that He is moving in powerful new ways. Our community has not been left out of the global movement of God.

What amazes me most is that God is using ordinary people—people like you and me—as catalysts for His work. As we continue through this ministry year, I pray we each recognize the part we play in carrying out God's mission here in Harlem.
